In my 27 years of working in senior services, I have found that learning never ceases. The world of health care and the demographics of our nation ensure that stagnation will not occur any time too soon. Henry Ford is quoted as saying, “Anyone who stops learning is old, whether at 20 or 80. Anyone who keeps learning stays young.” In this sense, my personal goal is to stay young.

Recently, I am learning firsthand the experience of having a parent who is rapidly moving through the final stages of life. My mother is in skilled nursing at Bridgewater Retirement Community in Virginia. From a distance, it has been interesting to follow her journey and compare it to life at Moravian Manor. Bridgewater is providing my mother with quality care, in many ways reminding me of our approach and philosophy at Moravian Manor.

I am certain the impact of this experience will develop my sympathy into empathy for other families along a similar journey. It is not possible to make this psychological revolution without experiencing the journey firsthand.

The following are a few things I am learning:

Being part of a Continuing Care Retirement Community (CCRC) matters. Our family examined and considered some quality stand alone Assisted Living facilities, as well as the CCRC. My mother’s care journey began in Assisted Living, progressing to a higher level of care within Assisted Living, and then smoothly transitioned to Skilled Nursing in a timely fashion. This resulted in optimal care continuity and was much easier for our family, as well as most importantly, our mother. The continuity of services is valuable.

- Communication is vital and important. Regular updates about any changes in my mother’s condition are reassuring and necessary.
- Constructive family involvement is helpful. I have two older brothers. Fortunately, when it comes to critical decisions, we are on the same page. Often this is not the case and can make the journey considerably more challenging...and the facility is caught in the middle.
- There are difficult decisions that must be made in terms of care. Even with a Living Will, not all the decisions are clear-cut. Often, we ask the question, “If mother were able to make the decision, what would she desire given her current physical condition?”
- Prayer is necessary and helpful. I pray regularly that my mother’s journey is peaceful and pain-free. Thus far, it has been. That is my most pressing fear.
- Staying connected and being present are important. Human connection has immense value and can benefit you both. Declines in health seldom come at “convenient” times. My trips to Virginia have increased in frequency. Some things at work and home have to wait. I have limited time with my mother; minor tasks at the moment have to wait.
- Long-term care is very expensive. Studies indicate the biggest financial worry about retirement is medical expenses. For most, you can reasonably budget for living expenses, but longevity and health care costs are wild cards. It is unsettling to see my mother’s reserves decrease at a rapid pace. Fortunately, my parents saved money for a rainy day. “It is raining.”
- This is but a mere snippet of some of my thoughts and emotions. Not everyone has been blessed with a wonderful mother. I have been; that makes the journey that much more difficult.

As Moravian Manor walks alongside families on their personal journey, I trust we are supportive. I realize during these times that there is no such thing as perfect. However, my desire would be that we keep the rain “gentle” and that it not be a “tsunami.”

Welcome to the Family

Exciting times are upon Moravian Manor's Inc. as we expand our family and welcome our new sister community, **Warwick Woodlands**. With site preparations beginning back in March, what was once a mere concept is quickly becoming a reality!

So much has happened over the past several weeks, from the donation of trees to the Lititz Shade Tree Commission to the shaping of retention basins and roadways. All this activity has created quite the buzz among Lancaster County residents. The Warwick Woodlands Sales team has noted a significant increase in sales activity, and anticipates this trend continuing throughout the course of the project.

Helping us make this concept a reality are our trusted project partners including: RLPS Architects, the architect for the entire project, RGS Associates, the land planner and landscape architects, Wohlsen Construction, the overall site contractor and builder of The Woods apartment building, and EG Stoltzfus, the builder for Phase One carriage homes and townhomes. Each partner is a leader in their specific discipline with solid reputations delivering the finest quality for our new community.

Phase I of Warwick Woodlands consists of 80 carriage homes and townhomes as well as 56 apartments. We have commitments on 61 of the 80 carriage homes and townhomes with three (3) of the nine (9) floor plans already sold out. Slated for the later part of Phase 1 is the Woods Apartments featuring 56 apartment homes and underground parking. Reservations for The Woods Apartments have already been received with two (2) of the seven (7) floor plans sold out. The Woods apartment building will also be home to the Owl's Nest Restaurant and Sippery where residents and their guests can grab a bite to eat in a comfortable and relaxed setting and enjoy each other's company.
